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With the signing of the School Safety and Resiliency Act, the Office of the State School Security Marshal (OSSSM) was established on March 11, 2019, to ensure state mandates are followed and school districts are held accountable for the safety and security of Kentucky's students and school staff.

The School Safety and Resiliency Act provides a commonsense approach to building security, mental health advocacy, emergency planning, law enforcement and staff training. By working together, Kentucky is leading the nation in school safety.

According to the 2022-2023 OSSSM risk-assessment report, implementing school safety and security mandates works. School districts are following the law at almost 100% compliance. This ensures that visitor protocols are being followed, exterior doors are secure and interior doors are closed and locked during instructional time. All these security measures are proven to keep students and staff as safe as possible.

Since the passing of House Bill 63 in 2022, the number of school resource officers (SRO) assigned to school campuses has increased to 613 officers assigned full-time to district campuses. SROs do more than ensure the safety and security of students and staff. They also serve as a trusted adult to many students by providing support, mentorship, and a positive influence.

In March 2023, Gov. Beshear signed House Bill 540 into law, expanding definitions related to the use of SROs in private or parochial schools, as well as public schools, creating consistency of expectations across different types of schools and furthering Kentucky's commitment to school safety.

The Department of Criminal Justice Training provides SROs with 120 hours of specialized training, in addition to basic law enforcement response for working in schools. This training includes mental health awareness classes, skills for working with special needs students, cultural diversity and active shooter response.

As Kentucky prepares for schools to reopen for the 2023-24 school year, OSSSM recommends that teachers and staff have a plan for critical incidents, that districts maintain emergency operation plans, and that teachers continue to secure classrooms, external doors and front entrances. Also, as funding and personnel allow, school districts should continue to be encouraged to assign an SRO to every campus in the state and work toward the goal of one school-based mental health professional for every 250 students.

OSSSM looks forward to continuing its partnerships in the coming year with the commonwealth's educational heroes and working together to create a better and safer Kentucky now and for future generations.

SAFETY & SECURITY RECOMMENDATIONS FOR 2023-24

- All school staff who encounter students must complete mandatory response to active shooter training and work together to maintain and update the best plan of action to protect students and staff.
- Ensure schools have an up-to-date emergency operations plan which includes consultation with first responders and procedures for reunification.
- As mandated by KRS 158.162, update emergency plans to include event-specific action plans that may include the provision of an automated external defibrillator (AED)
- Require school staff and first responders to rehearse venue-specific emergency action plans by simulation before the beginning of each athletic season.
- Continue training all front office staff to properly use security features, including the electronic door lock, camera, and intercom systems. Staff should also be trained on how to check in a visitor, ensure the proper ID is shown, and learn the reason for the visit.
- Continue working toward 100% compliance with School Safety and Resiliency Act mandates.
- Continue working toward the goal of one mental health professional per every 250 students, as funds and personnel become available.
- Continue working toward assigning a fulltime, certified school resource officer to every campus where one (1) or more school buildings are used to deliver instruction to students on a continual basis.
- Continue to foster a school climate where students and staff affirm the importance of controlling access to exterior doors and closing and locking classroom doors during instructional time.
